Big Walk & Wheel initiative




As you will be aware from recent correspondence from Mansel Park, road safety is very prominent and something that we are keen to work on a support in the local community. Mr Lodge and Mr Grace met with the travel team from the Local Authority this half term and are very excited to work on some travel to school initiatives starting with the Sustrans big walk and wheel!

Sustrans Big Walk and Wheel inspires pupils to make active journeys to school, improve air quality in their neighbourhood and discover how these changes benefit their world. Sustrans Big Walk and Wheel is open to all primary and secondary schools in the UK, including SEN/ASN/ALN schools. It is free to take part and there are daily prizes to be won. On each day of the challenge, schools compete to see who can get the highest percentage of their pupils walking, using a wheelchair, scooting or cycling to school. Your school's best five days will determine your final position, but you can log journeys on all ten days if you wish.

The launch assembly for this wonderful initiative will take place on Monday 4th March supported by the School Council team and a Local Authority representative.

We also explored mark making using red and yellow as these are lucky colours during Lunar new year. We had great fun pretending to be a dragon during our dragon dance too.

During our friendship week our 3+ year old friends have been looking at how to be a kind friend? Identifying those friends who make us feel happy and loved. We have read the 'Go away bird' by Julia Donaldson and Catherine Rayner, as well as 'Pip and Posy - The new friend' by Axel Scheffler. These stories have been really helpful and the children have been able to identify why the characters are sad and respond to questions such as "What could you do to help them become Happy?" or "what would you say to help?"

In our provision we have created our very own 'kindness cafe' with fancy tea party resources. We have also been talking about our special people at home. It has been lovely to listen to the children discussing their families with their friends.






YR Writing:

Y2 Writing






Y3 Writing
